District Training for November

The District members logged 166 hours of training.

20 hour CSTI certified First Responder Operations – Hazmat training will be conducted during the month of January 2009 for CCFRPD members and allied agencies. Didactic training will be conducted at the Mountain Ranch Community Center. Allied agencies will reimburse CCFRPD for the cost of the program.

Personnel

Current Response Personnel stands at: 16 active volunteers, three full time firefighter/officers (including the chief), one temporary hire, and one administrative assistant.

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1. We have posted notice for Firefighter Interns (aka Resident FF).
2. The Firefighter/EMT/AO position has been posted with a number of agencies and on the internet.
3. We are seeking support staff volunteers to assist with office operations, grant projects, augment emergency operations and move apparatus to service facilities.
4. Bill Schmiett has volunteered to act as District photographer and historian.
5. Employee Benefits –
 - a. The CalPERS 457B deferred compensation plan is now established. The plan is available for career staff and volunteer members (stipend). A CalPERS representative made a presentation during Tuesday evening drill December 9.
 - b. The District benefits broker is developing a proposal for the Employer Sponsored section 125 (IRS) Flexible Spending Account (FSA) for our employees. The FSA permits the employer to establish a fixed amount contributed for all employees.

Apparatus

Water Tender 121 returned to service November 26. However, an assessment of an oil leak at the rear main seal is being made to determine if it should be repaired at this time.

- Transmission and brake retarder repairs totaled \$5,196.12, servicing \$382.50 = \$5,578.62.
- September repairs and service work were \$3,074.82.
- Chassis, headlight/electrical repairs and servicing \$562.48.
- Four new tires \$1,353.63 (less installation).
- Fuel to and from service centers and staff hours are not included
- **Sub-total repairs and service cost \$10,569.55.**

Cost Recovery Program

I anticipate a staff report regarding the Cost Recovery Program and an amended program to be ready for discussion at the January Board meeting. The program would be used to recover the cost for services and supplies from insurance companies for calls for service involving people/incidents that are not local taxpayers, cases involving illegal behavior (code violation, alcohol or drugs), helicopter landings or in-depth fire investigations of suspicious fires.

The District members logged 171 hours of training.

Personnel

Current Response Personnel stands at: 16 active volunteers, three full time firefighter/officers (including the chief), one temporary hire, one full time administrative assistant.

1. We have posted notice for Firefighter Interns (aka Resident FF).
2. The role description and qualifications for entry-level career members is under revision to accurately reflect the District needs and expectations. Captain Stone and our career members are contributing to the document. The role and job announcement will be ready December 1.
3. We are seeking support staff volunteers to assist with projects, augment emergency operations and move apparatus to service facilities.
4. Employee Benefits –
 - a. I am proposing that the District adopt the Cal PERS 457B deferred compensation plan. The plan is available for career staff and volunteer members (stipend). The District would only be responsible for administering the elected member deduction and there is no fee to the District to provide this benefit to its members.
 - b. I am exploring the use of an Employer Sponsored section 125 (IRS) Flexible Spending Account (FSA) for our employees. A FSA will allow employees to efficiently use the employer contribution for health care, vision, dental, childcare, covering the cost of deductibles and co pay with pretax funds. As the employer, the District is able to structure the plan to the greatest employer and employee advantage. The FSA permits the employer to establish a fixed amount contributed for all

Building and Grounds

Station 1 day room (bay 3) repairs continue to be made by members as time permits. The Station 1 bathroom was rearranged and repainted. The bathroom requires a set of wall cabinets to efficiently use the available space and relieve some of our storage needs.

I would like to explore leasing office space at the Mountain Ranch Elementary School for administration. This may be an opportunity to relieve over crowding at fire station 1.

Water Tender 121 will return to service next week.

Communications

Billing for Service

Following up on a previous discussion with the board, I would like the Board to consider billing insurance companies for specific services and what parameters are appropriate for cost recovery. Services to consider may include response for vehicle accident traffic control, extrication, helicopter landing, hazardous materials response, suspicious fires investigation, and fires involving negligence or violations. I have included information from a billing contractor.

Community Activity

I introduced myself and made a presentation at the Mountain Ranch Community Potluck. The food was Great and the reception was warm.

Donations

The Railroad Flat VFW has donated a new American Flag for Station 1. Captain Miller managed the request and donation. Our veterans continue to serve the community in many ways. I wish to extend our sincere gratitude and admiration to the veterans.

Personnel

1. Current Response Personnel is @ 16 + 3 cadets and 4 Resident Firefighters.
2. We are seeking support staff volunteers to assist with projects, augment emergency operations and move apparatus to service facilities.

3. Health Savings Account – Health Savings accounts will not be an option for our members. Federal Regulations require participants to have a “high” deductible health plan, which is presently not an option. I will be evaluation other options.
4. There is member interest in having a 457B deferred compensation plan. The private plans have high administrative fees and deposit requirements. I received a CalPERS proposal for evaluation. I will make a recommendation during the next couple of months.

Building and Grounds

Station1 day room (bay 3) has been thoroughly cleaned and the block walls have been sealed. We will be sealing the cement floors, pulling portions of sheet rock contaminated with mildew. The sheet rock repairs will be done with cement backer board.

We are evaluation our options for storage and improving the efficiency of the facilities we have.

VFW has ordered a new American Flag for station 1.

Apparatus

Water Tender 121 is out of service, at Burton’s for repairs.

Used tires from storage were put on R123. Four new tires are waiting to be installed on WT121 when it returns from Burtons.

Fire Chiefs Association

No significant updates.

Calaveras Fire Investigation Unit

CCFRPD has three members, Captain Miller, Captain Stone and Chief Byrd. The team members have agreed on a standardized fire investigation form.

Mutual Aid

Engine Company 124 (with 2) and Chief 120 responded mutual aid for the Music Gulch structure fire. Chief Byrd assumed Operations and E124 (Captain Miller and FF/Intern Belshe) were the first due company. They cleared the attic and then Captain Miller took over Division 1 operations. We were on the incident from 2020 to 0046 hours. The operations went well and the occupants were able to stay in their home after outstanding overhaul and salvage operations.

Communications Plan

The radio service vendor plans to be at our facility the Friday October 10th.

Landline:

I intend to enroll the District in the CalNet contract with ATT over the next couple of months (lengthy process). I anticipate a 30% savings on landline communications.

We are evaluating the practicality of removing the hardwire phone at Station 4 (Glencoe) and installing a cell phone in a lock box. The basic line presently cost \$46/ mo, whereas, a cell phone can be added to our existing plan for \$10/month.

Mapping & GPS

Michael O'Keefe's maps were the only ones in the county that showed the location of Music Gulch for the structure fire Friday October 3...Central Calaveras FRPD units found the location with very little difficulty, thanks to Michael.

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MONTHLY FIRE CHIEF REPORT SEPTEMBER 11, 2008

Reflecting on the terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001. We remember the suffering endured by the victims, the responders and our country. We remember the heroic response to the call to duty by so many responders and civilians. 343 members of our ranks made the ultimate sacrifice for their neighbor that day. The sacrifice continues as responders succumbed to stress and respiratory ailments. Likely they wouldn't have called themselves Hero's. Likely they would have said they were blessed to be a firefighter and fulfill what God had sent them to do.

The alarm has been sounded and the watchtower fires lit. Each of the 343 firefighters, killed in action on September 11, 2001, is a member of the fire service body, as are each of our members. Our goal is to be prepared, our objective is life safety and our tactic is training. We train like our life depends on it...because it does.

Building and Grounds

Station 1 day room has been thoroughly cleaned and we are preparing to seal the block and cement floors.

Stations 2, 3, 4, 5 lock combinations and door opener keypads have been changed due to recent staff turnover.

Apparatus

Water Tender 121 is on limited service – headlights are intermittent. A separate status memo is available.

Tires were installed on E125 and the command vehicle. We are using qualified tires on hand to eliminate tire storage. More tires will be replaced prior to winter.

Equipment inventory is still in progress

Fire Chiefs Association

No significant updates.

Mutual Aid

Engine Company 124 (with 3) and WT121 responded to the Smitty Fire at West Point immediate need STXCA4053C, September 1.

Engine 123 (with two), Rescue 121 and myself covered the district from station 1.

Engine 124 returned to quarters at 0105 hours and WT121 returned 1009 hours the next day.

West Point Fire's Rescue 315 crashed over an embankment September 5. E124 and R121 responded mutual aid. I added myself to West Point's alarm matrix while Chief Carroll cared for his injured members.

Communications

I will be developing a communications plan to include all modes of communications for the District. The plan will be dynamic due to the length of time it takes to address multiple components and pending changes nationwide.

Cell phone:

Verizon has the CalNet 2 wireless phone (cell) contract. Reportedly, Gold Country Communications has the best cell phone coverage in our district and has executed a contract with Calaveras Water Agency to locate additional cell towers in our area. I have invited Gold Country Communications to evaluate and provide a proposal to address the District cell phone needs.

- 3 watt bag phone for command
- PDA or equivalent for the chief
- Limited use or prepaid phone for staffed engine
- Limited use or prepaid phone for Strike Team assignments

Landline:

ATT advised me that we are eligible for the CalNet (State Telecommunications) contract. I will be assessing the advantages of the CalNet and other small business plans with the objective of lowering our landline telephone expenses.

Two Way Radios:

I asked a radio communications vendor to evaluate and provide a proposal for the District mobile radio installations, batter support unit, elevated antenna, and elevated cell phone antenna. The District will be deploying five mobile and seven handheld, narrow band, grant purchased radios during the next 90 days. Additionally there are a number of pagers that require repair.

Mapping & GPS

It is important to know evacuation routes, helispots, safe refuge, roads, facilities and other map related tools to respond to and plan for emergencies. GPS tied to a mapping program, on the Tough Book computer in the command vehicle, would facilitate command decisions made in the field. I will determine what best meets the District needs and provide my evaluation.
